

## Cincinnati ranks 4th for new grads

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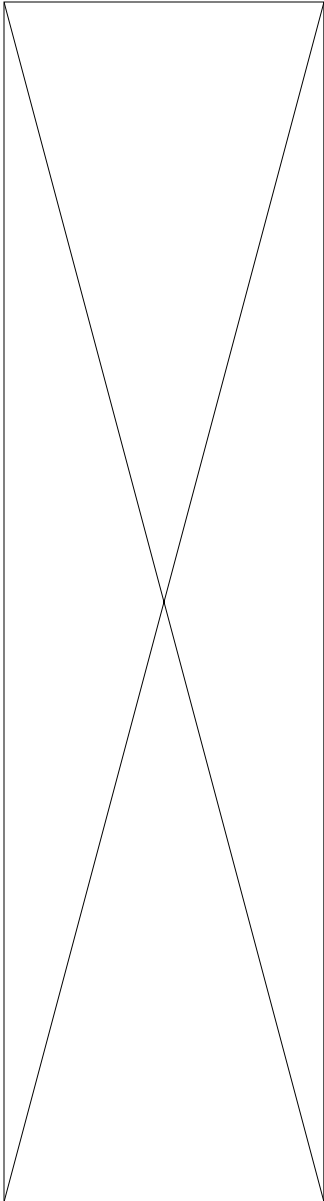
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Cincinnati is rated the fourth-best city for new college graduates by Apartments.com and CBcampus.com - CareerBuilder's college job search Web site. This is their second annual "Top 10 Best Cities for Recent College Graduates" list.

"Given the current economy, new grads looking to relocate are becoming increasingly concerned with the cost of living as they are faced with more competition for jobs than seen in previous years," said Tammy Kotula, public relations and promotions manager at Apartments.com. "With these very real concerns weighing on the minds of many, two leading online resources for apartments and jobs have come together to paint a realistic landscape of both the job market and cost of living in the most popular cities for young adults after college."

Criteria included inventory of jobs requiring less than one year of experience, the average cost of rent for a one-bedroom apartment and highest concentration of young adults ages 20-24. Average rent in Cincinnati was \$691 for a one-bedroom apartment.

Indianapolis topped the list, followed by Philadelphia and Baltimore. Cleveland was fifth. Rounding out the top 10: New York, Phoenix, Denver, Chicago, San Antonio.



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
